Course Description and Objectives

What is Moodle? How can I use it to keep up with my courses, contact my professors, and submit assignments? We'll answer these questions and more during one forty-five minute introductory session.

Requirements and Evaluation

We will employ a variety of methods to assess learning and fulfillment of course objectives. These include examinations, reading reflections and research assignments, and classroom discussions. Moodle, the learning management system we employ, contains all details regarding assignments, grading criteria, due dates and feedback.

Attendance and Participation (10%)

You must attend and participate in class consistently to succeed in this class. I will record attendance for each class period. If you miss class, you will need to obtain the material you missed from another student and review the class activities in your own time.

Forum Engagement (20%)

Most weeks (excepting those weeks with exams) I will ask you to answer a short-essay question based on your engagement with assigned materials and our class discussion. You will post these answers in a forum by end-of-day Sunday. You will then respond to at least one classmate's post by end-of-day Monday.

Essays (70%)

You will respond to writing several writing prompts during this class. Your responses must meet the APA 6th edition standards; they will be graded against the Undergraduate Writing Rubric, posted in Moodle.
